WELCOME! As we approach our 46th anniversary, I am excited to present the lineup of the 2018 Stanford Jazz Festival. Each year, we strive to present a compelling mix of great

musicians and educators, putting living legends alongside established jazz leaders and rising stars, to offer you a breathtaking array of concerts, from the familiar and satisfying to the unknown and thrilling. This summer, I believe you'll experience all of this and more.

Joshua Redman and his longtime quartet will get the Festival started at Bing Concert Hall on June 23. An alum of our summer camps, Josh has had a regular presence on the SJW faculty and at the Festival since his career took off nearly three decades ago. His work continually breaks new ground, yet his improvisatory genius and gorgeous sound remain constant

elements.

Several of Joshua's equally influential contemporaries make appearances as well this season, all of them artists at the peak of their creative energies. Grammy-winning bassist Christian McBride appears with his sound-of-Philly-infused New Jawn (page 16), and we present violinist Regina Carter in duets and quartet settings with brilliant pianist Xavier Davis (page 24). Woodwind master Anat Cohen shows two facets of her musical persona, one in a special performance of rhythmically enticing and melodically emotive Brazilian jazz with the great guitarist Romero Lubambo and keyboardist Vitor Gonçalves

(page 27), and again with SJW's beloved faculty artist, the vocalist and pianist Dena DeRose (page 29) in a program devoted to their mutual love of jazz standards.

With careers spanning decades of jazz history, several of our Festival artists bring particularly impressive artistry and life experience to the stage and to our students this summer. We're delighted to welcome back composer and tenor saxophonist Jimmy Heath, who grew up in Philly with John Coltrane, and over the last 70+ years played with Miles Davis, Dizzy, and so many other jazz masters. Pianist Dick Hyman (page 17) performed with Charlie Parker, has mastered every style of jazz piano, and still gives performances as vital and exciting as ever, appears with his close friend and woodwind virtuoso Ken Peplowski. Alto master Charles McPherson (page 30) made post-bop history in the studio with Charles Mingus, as well as on his own recordings, and we showcase him here with his New York quartet. Drummer Roy McCurdy logged time in Cannonball Adderley's quintet as well as with other jazz legends, and he joins SJW faculty for

the first time this year in our special tribute to Cannonball on the 90th anniversary of his birth, and the 60th anniversary of some of his most important recordings.

I'm always thrilled to see young artists develop and to follow their careers as they take off, much as I did with Joshua Redman and his career. Along these lines, we welcome back Andrea Motis, the young trumpet and vocal artist from Barcelona (page 35). Andrea bonded with SJW and our students last year, and this year she's bringing Joan Chamorro, her mentor and the founder of the famed Sant Andreu Jazz Band. They'll be joined at our closing concert in Bing Concert Hall on August 4 with the great trombonist Wycliffe Gordon and the SJW 50/50 Jazz Orchestra, a gender-equal ensemble made up of some of the Bay Area's finest jazz musicians.

I'm equally excited to present several other risings stars for the first time, including trumpet and vocal sensation Bria Skonberg (page 25), Monk sax competition winner Melissa Aldana (page 33), guitarist Yotam Silberberg (performing with Charles McPherson, page 30), and the bassist Or Bareket, whom we're presenting in partnership with Stanford Live in the intimate Bing Studio (page 17).

Any organization that operates for as long as we have with the kind of artist and faculty loyalty that we enjoy will inevitably be required to observe the passing of beloved community members. This season, we're missing the great drummer and educator Ndugu Chancler, one of the world's great musicians, who passed away earlier this year. We will honor and remember Ndugu with a special tribute concert on July 26 (page 28).

As you peruse the pages that follow, I hope you'll be enticed by many other truly fine performers, all of whom are contributing to the arc of what I truly feel is one of the best Stanford Jazz Festival lineups ever.

I look forward to seeing you this summer at the Stanford Jazz Festival.

UNITING JAZZ EDUCATION AND PERFORMANCE The SJW family is incomplete without you. 1972

Founded in 1972 by Jim Nadel, the Stanford Jazz Workshop (SJW) consisted initially of simple jam sessions for jazz enthusiasts, held at the Stanford Coffee House. Ticketed performances for the general public were added as top level jazz artists such as Stan Getz and Dizzy Gillespie got involved, and the Stanford Jazz Festival was born. Our immersive week-long education camps have grown up alongside the Festival: The best jazz artists come to us to teach, as well as to play. Today the Festival and the camps stand as a unique, self-contained "village," where performers, educators, students, and fans mingle freely as they play, practice, and enjoy jazz.



Most of the greatest artists of our time have taught and/or performed for us, including 58 of the 149 NEA Jazz Masters and four MacArthur Fellows. Quite a few SJW alumni have emerged as stars in recent years: Ambrose Akinmusire, Ravi Coltrane, Taylor Eigsti, Joshua Redman, Jenny Scheinman, and Dayna Stephens, among many others.

And we continue to grow. In 2004, we launched the Mentor Fellowship program, a professional development opportunity for emerging educators.

Thank you for allowing me to see where I want to be.



I am 16 years old. I play the alto and soprano saxophone, as well as the clarinet, and I have been playing jazz for four years. It has been a pleasure to learn so much from not just musical greats, but also philosophical speakers. [I have seen] plenty of great musicians, but I have never been able to deeply interact with so many musicians anywhere other than the Stanford Jazz Workshop.

I am not always the best at putting my thoughts into words, and playing my horn allows me to communicate pure emotion. When I play jazz, I feel as if the rhythm section creates an emotional environment, and the horn players or any other improvisor react to that any way they want to.

Playing jazz is like talking: You can't talk better than anyone else, but vou can learn to be articulate in your own way, and that is what we are learning to do right now. In the past, I never felt like I was a very stable person, and I could be tipped over easily. In a weird way jazz has been an anchor for me, because I can be free.







When Julian "Cannonball" Adderley released *Somethin' Else* 60 years ago, he secured his position in the top echelon of jazz. Cannonball was already riding high as a member of Miles Davis' band, and this influential album helped establish Cannonball as a leader and an artist with his own style, distinct from the legions of Charlie Parker imitators. 


