Mentor Fellows teach, inspire, and perform for SJW students – and simultaneously learn from established professionals. They leave ready to apply the accumulated knowledge and bestpractices from SJW's long history. Alumni call the Fellowship a career-enhancing experience. ### Andrew Speight 1964-2022

SJW is reeling from the sudden passing of Andrew Speight late this year. It's an understatement to say that Andrew was an integral part of SJW's education programs, the Stanford Jazz Festival, and the SJW community.

A native of Sydney, Australia, Andrew got to perform with great touring artists such as Benny Carter, Nat Adderley, and Percy Heath. His debut album, Andrew Speight Quartet, won the Australian equivalent of a Grammy. He moved to the U.S. in the early 1990s to lead the jazz department at Michigan State University, then came to San Francisco State.

He joined the SJW faculty in 2001, and first performed at the Stanford Jazz Festival in 2004, with Harold Mabern and Peter Bernstein. He made over 30 Festival appearances, including this season's Tribute to Nancy Wilson and Cannonball Adderley and the SJW All-Star Jam.

Students and SJW faculty recall Andrew's limitless generosity, where he would spend hours after a jam session, rehearsal, or concert in order to share his vast knowledge of jazz and to inspire motivated young musicians.

Truly one of the foremost experts on the music of Charlie Parker – and one of the few artists who assimilated his style – Andrew led two Festival performances featuring the legendary music of the venerated *Bird With Strings* albums in 2011 and 2019 (shown at right, middle).

Andrew was an equal with the great artists of jazz. In this photo from the 2013 SJW All-Star Jam, he's completely in his element, blowing with Harold Mabern, Chris Potter, Larry Koonse, Brian Lynch, Andrew Speight, Larry Grenadier, Eric Alexander, Steve Davis, and Louis Hayes (shown at right, bottom).





### SJW Homecoming 2022

To deepen the celebration of the 50th Anniversary season, Jim Nadel wanted to have an event especially for people who had attended one of SJW's summer programs, no matter how long ago. Stanford Coffee House (CoHo) hosted the SJW Homecoming 2022 on July 2, and nearly 60 alumni attended, representing every era in SJW's history. Bert Carelli and Bob Murphy were part of the initial events in 1972 that precipitated the formation of SJW; Bert expertly emceed the afternoon, and SJW Faculty and Camp Director Steven Lugerner led the jam session. ### All The Things We Are: 50 Years of the Stanford Jazz Workshop

SJW's archives are the stuff of legend. Photos, recordings in every imaginable format, concert posters, and even boxes of tee shirts occupy closets and corners in the offices. To help bring this amazing record of jazz history to light, editor extraordinaire Matt Campbell shepherded the production of a commematorive book celebrating five decades of SJW entitled, All The Things We Are.

Jacobs School of Music, might stop by for a talk. When bassist Chuck Israels or guitarist John Abercrombie came through town, "I would get them involved," Nadel said. "Mostly to speak at the Workshop and then come by the jam session."

Though the musicians' grapevine connected far-flung jazz outposts long before the advent of the internet, Nadel knew that the Workshop had attained a new level of visibility in 1977 with the arrival of Dr. Sylvan "Schmoe" Elhay, an accomplished saxophonist from Adelaide, Australia. "He's a beautiful horn player and he still comes every few years," Nadel said. "We were playing the tunes of the day. The new Freddie Hubbard record would come out and we'd memorize his and Joe Henderson's solos. Freddie would come to town and we'd all go see him, and of course he'd play all those songs with completely different solos-and they were every bit as amazing as the ones on the record!"

Part of what made the Workshop different than other jazz educational settings was that Nadel didn't impose a particular agenda. He realized that the music didn't sing or swing in a singular voice. Instead jazz was and is a gloriously wild and multifarious chorus. "Studying and talking to all the musicians, it became clear to me that there's not one way to play the music correctly or one way to teach it," he said. "My one big idea is there are such diverse approaches to the music that the ideal way to teach it is to foster a community with multiple approaches."

That's due to the amazing skills of our band directors: Kristen Strom, Dave Gregoric, and Mike Galisatus, as well as the talented coaching staff for the Giant Steps Big Bands: Danny Gerz and Ryan Trujillo.

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
